HU Students Teach Through Ice Cream Science

Heritage students Christina Valdez and Rachel Fernandez faced a challenge—how could they make science fun and memorable for third graders? The answer was as easy as vanilla ice cream.

This fall the two taught science classes in an after-school program at Kirkwood Elementary School in Toppenish as part of their college practicum. Education students at Heritage complete a practicum the semester before starting their student teaching. They work like a teacher: developing curriculum and instructional plans, teaching in a classroom setting and documenting the impact on student learning.

For Christina and Rachel, the experience was a chance to put into play everything they learned during their studies at Heritage. Twice a week for six weeks, the two met with elementary school children for lessons in science. One such lesson focused on teaching children about solid and liquid states of elements. They used bags of ice, rock salt, milk, sugar, vanilla and a whole lot of kid power to demonstrate how liquids change to become solids. The lesson was a success. As the children danced about shaking chilled bags filled with a liquid solution, they called out the results of their experiment and could clearly explain what was happening.

“It was great. We had kids coming up to us asking what we were going to do next time,” said Christina.

The Kirkwood students were not the only ones learning during these science courses. Christina explained that the practicum reinforced her decision to become a teacher as well as gave her insight and confidence in her ability to take control of a classroom.

“Teaching the kids and seeing them grasp what they are learning is above and beyond anything I expected,” she said. “They look at you with different eyes.” ■

New Partnership Builds Program

Our Clinical Laboratory Science program is growing. Starting in the fall, students will have the option of completing their clinical internships in either in Yakima or the Tri-Cities.

The expansion not only gives students more options, but allows Heritage to meet the growing demand for laboratory scientists by opening the program to more students. It was made possible by a partnership formed with Tri-Cities Laboratory. They join existing partners Yakima Valley Memorial Hospital and Yakima Regional Medical and Cardiac Center.

Laboratory scientists work with pathologists and physicians performing blood, tissue and bodily fluid testing to aid in the diagnosis and treatment of disease. ■

Board Appoints Next President

Following a national presidential search that garnered more than 100 highly-qualified applicants, Heritage University's Board of Directors appointed Dr. John Bassett as the second university president. Dr. Bassett currently serves as president of Clark University in Worcester, MA. He will start his position at Heritage this summer.

"I can think of no greater calling than to lead Heritage University," said Dr. Bassett. "Higher education is the foundation for our future success as a society. Heritage was founded on the belief no one should be denied access for reasons of poverty, culture or geography. My wife Kay and I are thrilled by the opportunity to live in the Pacific Northwest and build on the work of Dr. Ross."

The search for the second university president began early last year after Dr. Kathleen Ross announced her plans to leave the presidency. She remains in her position until Dr. Bassett's arrival. Once the transition is complete, she will lead Heritage's new national institute on improving educational access and graduation rates for first generation college students.

"I always knew my work at Heritage would not be complete until I was able to pass the torch onto the next president," said Dr. Ross. "I am confident that this university will grow and prosper under Dr. Bassett's leadership." ■

Gone But Not Forgotten

Beloved professor Dr. Jack McPherson passed away in September after a long battle with cancer. He was 75.

Dr. McPherson's dedication to his field led to two master's degrees, a Ph.D. in Vocational Education and School Administration and a career that spanned 50 years. While at Heritage, he served as chair of Professional Studies in the College of Education and Psychology, a position held since 2000. During his tenure he helped more than 800 students earn their degrees and move into teaching careers.

"Dr. McPherson was one of our most revered and respected professors," said Karen Campbell, chair of Educational Administration. "He had a way of making each and every student feel special."

Dr. McPherson was honored in spring 2009 for his years of service with the Heritage University Board of Directors Faculty Teaching Award.

Honoring a Life's Work

At 88 years old, Virginia Beavert is a rock star. Not the kind that sells out amphitheatres or makes the cover of fan magazines. But, to linguistics and Native American cultural studies students, she's up there with the musical elite.

In September, Heritage University honored Virginia for her contributions to preserving the Sahaptin language. Leaders from the Yakama Nation, community leaders, educators and students all gathered to celebrate and show their respect and appreciation.

Sahaptin is the language of the indigenous people of the Columbia Basin. With fewer and fewer families speaking their native dialects in the home, Sahaptin is in danger of being forgotten.

"Language is a foundation of culture," said Dr. Winona Wynn, chair of English and Humanities and coordinator of Dream Catchers. "The work that Virginia has done as an educator and historian is helping to keep the Sahaptin

language alive as well as preserve the Yakama's culture."

Virginia started teaching Sahaptin at Heritage in 1991. She continued to teach for nearly 15 years before moving to Oregon to pursue a doctoral degree in linguistics. Today, she continues to pursue both her own education as well as inspiring the next generation of linguists, teaching Sahaptin at the University of Oregon. She recently published *Ichishkiin Sinwit Yakama/ Yakima Sahaptin Dictionary* which will soon be available through Amazon.com.

"Virginia is an amazing woman. I've never met anyone so full of energy," said Dr. Wynn. "She is very much respected and revered by her people and educators." ■

Alumna Leads Innovative School

For Heritage alumna Deidre Holmberg risks are just opportunities waiting to be taken. This self-described adventurer's career in education has taken her from classrooms in Italy, Saudi Arabia and Pasco, Washington to opening what is perhaps the most innovative public school in Central Washington.

Shortly after completing her Educational Administration certificate at Heritage in 2008, Deidre took the lead as planning principal for Delta High School in Richland, Washington. Delta is a Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) school that focuses on helping kids at all academic levels to learn through creativity and problem solving using its four core elements throughout all curriculums. STEM schools are a new concept in education that are gaining national attention. They are heavily supported by Battelle, a leading corporation in science and technology. Delta was jointly founded by Battelle; Pasco, Richland and Kennewick School Districts; and two area colleges.

Bringing Delta to its opening date was a herculean effort. It involved coordinating the three school districts, each with their own set of policies, busing schedules and calendars; building curriculums; hiring qualified educators; finding students who wanted to try something new with parents willing to take a risk; and getting the place where everything could come together. Deidre entered the project in July 2008, just after the State of Washington gave its blessing and recruitment efforts began in earnest.

“I knew that this would really be different and we could have a huge impact on the way that American high schools happen,” said Deidre.

But, she admits getting people to buy into the vision was a big challenge.

“When I started we had no facility, no curriculum, just this really cool idea,” she said.

She spent the next year working with educators, parents, and community leaders to spread the word and find students. In September of 2009, the work and risk paid off when Delta High School opened with its inaugural class of 100 freshmen. The school will grow over the next four years to its maximum of 400 students.

For Deidre, the next challenge lies in turning naysayers into supporters. Her goal is to help her kids soar past their previous test scores. It's a goal she is confident she will reach.

“If you put kids and families first, always, you can accomplish a ton of stuff,” she said. ■
